Patti Rothberg and Hayden are two new singer/songwriters who are making serious noise—and killer music.

eep your ears open for **Hayden**, a 25-year-old gravelly voiced singer/songwriter/guitarist from Toronto whose first album, *Everything I Long For*, has recently been released in the U.S. This is no ordinary debut: Hayden hoopla was so huge in Canada that fleets of major-label American music execs flew north to encourage the

overwhelmed musician to sign on the dotted line. You don't have to go figure: *Everything* cements Hayden's rep as a *major* songwriting talent as he rasps about everything from sharing a midnight snack with a crush to what it would be like to be one of Susan Smith's drowned sons. So what if he occasionally sounds like Eddie Vedder with strep—he's worth listening to.

Patti Rothberg's debut album, Between the One & the Nine (EMI), is in stores right now (maybe you've even seen the video for her single, "Inside"), but it wasn't too long ago that the 24-year-old was singing for spare change in a New York City subway station. With wayhonest lyrics (check out "Treat Me Like Dirt"), a bluesy voice and a guitar style that brings legendary riffer Joan Jett to mind, it's no shock that Patti is getting tons of college radio play—the "Buzz Bin" of the airwayes.
